CAA identification numbers

Last October we advised you that the EMPIC licensing module successfully went live. Pilots, maintenance engineers and air traffic controllers can now apply for and manage their licences online. They do this by registering to access "MyAviation". In the process participants are provided a <u>one-time</u> number to allow them to access the portal.

We have experienced several applicants who have confused their <u>one-time</u> number with their CAA participant ID number. This has resulted in incorrect CAA participant ID numbers on medical certificates.

Massey University visit

On 24 January some of the team visited Massey University School of Aviation for their orientation day. We presented on pilot health wellbeing with a focus on mental health and AOD issues. The importance of seeking help and where pilots can get help were important topics of this discussion. The important role of Medical Examiners was also discussed with respect to co-ordinating support and negotiating CAA's regulatory system.

CAA Av Med initiatives

CAA AvMed is well aware that we need to provide better support and advice to pilots, ATCs and MEs in the areas of mental health, AOD, healthcare avoidance and non-disclosure of medical conditions. We have been fortunate to have observer status in the FAA Advisory and Rulemaking Mental Health working group as well as the findings of the EASA MESAFE project.

We are working on an initiative to meet the challenges posed by pilot/ATC healthcare avoidance and non-disclosure of changes in medical condition. More to be disclosed at the Queenstown conference.

We have more initiatives in the pipeline.

Aviation Related Concerns

We have had 19 ARCs over the last year. The medical team has a system that carefully evaluates the validity and evidence for health-related concerns raised by third parties about

pilots or air traffic controllers. Whilst a range of issues are raised, many relate to mental health or AOD concerns.
